So get ahead of the crowds and book a weekend at the new **Villa Clarisse**, which opens in May down the road from **L'Hôtel de Toiras**, its sister hotel. Both have port-side locations in Saint-Martin but Villa Clarisse offers a more intimate stay with just 10 rooms, each decorated by Pierre-Yves Rochon. Hotel de Toiras (00-33-5 46 35 40 32; www.hotel-de-toiras.com) has doubles from  $\pounds 112$ . Villa Clarisse (00-33-5 46 35 40 32; www.villaclarisse.com) has doubles from  $\pounds 146$ .



#### **BRITISH BEACH RETREATS**

For fresh seafood and fine sea views, try **South Sands** (01548-859000; www.southsands.com), a new boutique hotel which opened last season just outside Salcombe in Devon. It is beautifully designed yet low-key, and boasts the services of seafood maestro Mitch Tonks. Beach Suites with terraces sleep up to six people, with space for entertaining. Doubles cost from £120 per night. Alternatively, in Dorset, **Alexandra Hotel** in Lyme Regis (01297-442010; www.hotelalexandra.co.uk) is a well-placed gem a short coastal stroll away from Mark Hix's famed Oyster & Fish House.

## DESTINATION PROFILE PORTO CERVO, SARDINIA

After 50 years of designer-label desecration Porto Cervo, a dazzlingly glamorous cove in northern Sardinia, has a new champion. One man has vowed to restore its authenticity by a process that could be termed 'reverse gentrification', with a particular emphasis on local cuisine. The man is Andrea Brugnoni, who aims to 'bring back the perfume of bread in Porto Cervo' by way of a new promenade – parallel to the ostentatious boardwalk – where traditional artisans can sell their produce. It took Brugnoni six years to bring the promenade to life (this is its second season), and each of the 30 or so retail units are conscientiously built using local materials. The



main square boasts a mozzarella bar called Mozz'Art serving some of the freshest buffalo mozzarella we've ever tasted, Spazio Rossana Orlandi, a chic lifestyle store, as well as MdM, a small design museum. So far, so Sardinian, but some international flavour did sneak its way in last summer, in the form of a pop-up of the London bar Boujis, a Ruinart champagne bar and Yoba, a Parisian lingerie boutique. There is also talk of a Milanese fusion restaurant serving sushi and Brazilian food. So the traditional Sardinian theme somewhat comes and goes. But identity crisis aside, the Promenade du Port has plenty going for it and it's still early days. Leo Bear Promenade du Port (www.promenadeduport.com) opens for the summer season in May. Seasons (01244-202000; www.seasons.co.uk) offers seven nights at Hotel Cala di Volpe from £2,735 per person including half-board, flights from London and private transfers.
